

# Headmaster's address at Speech Day

**Mr Packer, Chairman, Governors, Parents and pupils, guests,**  
 In August of 2009 I travelled to Edinburgh to see a production of the musical *Oliver!* It now seems a long time ago, but I suspect that the pupils involved in it will still have vivid memories of the sell-out run, as well as the reception they received when they brought the show back to Eltham. All those who saw it were amazed by the energy and quality of the performance, especially by the youngest boys or Fagin's urchins. Mr Ben Pollard rightly received tremendous plaudits for his direction of the show: he has now directed four musicals and all have inspired performers and audiences alike. A Year 7 boy discovered upon arriving here in September that our music staff, Mr Tighe and Mrs Oldfield, thought he had a strong clear voice, and so he was inspired to audition for *Oliver!* Having missed the opportunity to perform in our production, he went to the production in the West End! Meanwhile two other trebles in Year Seven successfully passed through professional auditions - one has been performing in the new Andrew Lloyd Weber musical *Love Never Dies* since Easter, while the other successfully performed in the Royal Academy of Music's production of Benjamin Britten's opera *Albert Herring*. I have just heard today that three other boys have been offered parts in this autumn's production of *La Bohème*. It is fair to say that none of these three might have considered such opportunities if they had not been encouraged to develop their voices and believe in their abilities. The self-belief and confidence that comes from singing in any of our choirs reveals itself in these boys' efforts: they have all been inspired to go that little further, to test their talents.

Schools should try at all times to provide inspiration for their pupils: sometimes this comes from individual teachers – there is no doubt that the art which has been on display around Central Hall this year has been inspired by the passion and enthusiasm of Ms Brass and this year's Artist-in-Residence, Martine Borge. Art may now have moved on from the "safe" world I used to know into the world of installation art and video clips, but the success of the study-breaks in Tuscany is testimony to Ms Brass' ability to inspire and encourage our pupils to go outside the box.

Trips can often prove the stimulus for future projects or study. The voyages around the Galapagos Islands or the trek across the volcanic landscapes of Iceland are obvious in their scope to inspire budding students of Darwin or geology. The Iceland trip had the addition benefit of a volcano actually exploding; no-one really objected to staying an extra six days in Reykjavik and missing the start of term...especially as volcanoes might crop up in the examinations! The cricket tour to Australia was an amazing opportunity for our boys to show the Aussies what we were made of: I was very pleasantly surprised at the text messages I received from the other side of the world just

before Christmas telling me of their successes in Adelaide and Melbourne. Perhaps the forthcoming Ashes Tour this winter inspired our team to raise their game to new heights: or maybe it was Mr Thorogood's ability to secure the title of manager of the month!

Sport is an area where young people can be inspired by famous and talented role models. The visit of Danny Care and Ugo Monye, the England rugby players, proved to be such an example with over 150 boys having some training with them, and the results in the games immediately afterwards showed how our boys had played with a greater passion and determination in emulation of these international players. Their visit was sponsored by the Development Office's Annual Fund, who had set aside money this year to attract distinguished and inspirational visitors to the school. The music department have also tapped into this fund to attract three national figures from the world of classical musical, Christopher Hirons, Crispian Steele-Perkins, and James O'Donnell have all been to Eltham this year to lead workshops and Masterclasses in Strings, Brass and Choral singing. Plans for visiting poets, artists and cricketers are being drawn up for next year's programme.

Many of us recall our school days by remembering those staff who had a major impact on us: I remember my old Housemaster at school who tore up my Centigrade Careers assessment when it said I would make a good architect – he said that I was obviously going to be a teacher and that I needn't take any notice of that "tosh". I wonder who Mr Packer will recall from his time at Eltham: the story goes that he was not particularly inspired at Eltham and it was not until he found his niche in the Army that he really discovered his true calling. I suspect however that there will be many pupils past and present who will remember Mr Julian Hind, who retires from the Mathematics Department after twenty-seven years here. Julian has never been someone to worry too much about keeping his mark-book up to date, but this has never got in the way of achieving excellent results. His interests have always been diverse and as he said when he

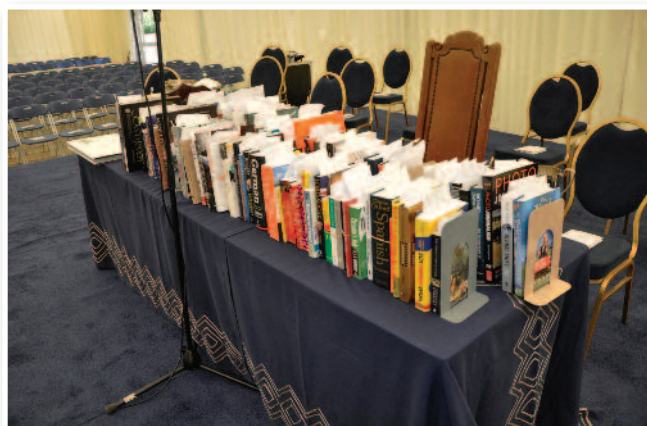




delivered his final address to the Upper Sixth in Chapel, his arrival at Eltham was somewhat clouded in mystery – at least for the Headmaster of the time, who didn't recall actually appointing him. But as a Mathematics teacher, Housemaster who then became the co-ordinator of the House Competition (in other words, the only one who understands the scoring system!), cross-country and chess coach as well as the deviser of the annual General Knowledge Quiz, he has certainly left his mark. He will be sorely missed and we wish him well as he embarks on a new career as a vintner!

The Reverend Robert Draycott has also contributed a great deal to the school over the past 18 years: as Chaplain and Head of Religious Studies he has had to perform two roles which do not automatically appeal to today's youth. His success in attracting pupils to extend their short course in RS into a full GCSE, and the popularity of the trips to religious retreats like Iona and Corymeela both show how he managed to overcome the stereotypical response to Religion at school. Some of his Assemblies have been legendary: yes, Eric Liddell and the Chapel Window may both have featured on a regular basis, but the one that stands out for me was when back in 2001, he recreated the Beckham free kick against the Greeks to qualify for the 2002 World Cup – and how the Chaplain actually did kick a ball to the boy he had identified down the nave! Many Old Elthamians will testify to Rev Draycott's warmth and sensitivity when dealing with requests for him to conduct their wedding or to lead a funeral. This could not have been more obvious than on the occasion of the tragic death of Miss Nicola Culshaw in a car accident. Miss Culshaw had just left us in December to become Head of Chemistry at Sydenham High School, and the Chaplain was preparing to conduct her marriage service in the Chapel when we learnt of Miss Culshaw's death. He was then asked by her family to conduct the funeral service at the crematorium and immediately afterwards to return to the College Chapel where a service of Thanksgiving was held. These are the aspects of the role of Chaplain that many people at school don't ever hear about or see, but I can assure you that all who have turned to the Reverend Draycott for support in such circumstances have found real solace in his kindness and comforting words. His plans in retirement are not yet finalised but I am sure that we would all want to wish him well for the future.

Miss Culshaw's fiancé, Dan, who was also seriously injured in the car accident was allowed out of hospital to attend the Thanksgiving Service. He has expressed a wish that Nicola



should be remembered through the awarding of a prize for a young Chemist - not necessarily the best chemist, but the one who has made the most progress, someone that Nicola might have inspired. We are very touched that Dan's parents are able to be with us today to witness the awarding of this prize later this evening: we are proud to honour Nicola's memory in this way.

Mr Paul Floyd arrived in 2004 to be a teacher of History and Politics: his stories of shark-tagging in South Africa and other exploits in the financial world quickly convinced me to ask him to oversee the organisation of the Headmaster's Leavers' Ball which he did most effectively for four years; shortly after this I appointed him Head of Liberal Studies, Head of Politics, and eventually Head of Careers. He has also overseen a series of visits from American and Chinese children who came to Eltham to debate Global issues; at the same time he drew up the Eltham College Travel Plan with the London Borough of Bromley, and this led to our new bike sheds being installed. It was obvious that it would not be long before he gained a position in Senior Management and we wish him well as he heads off to darkest Oxfordshire to become Director of Studies at Cokethorpe School. I should like to thank him for all his efforts, in particular in the promotion of Politics, a subject which now prompts a large number of applications to university. I must also mention his tremendous end of year reports and references which are full of words and phrases that very few of us have understood but we all know that they mean a lot. We shall watch his future career with interest.

Mrs Kimberley Wyatt leaves us to become Head of English at Warwick School: Kimberley will be sorely missed in the English Department at Eltham. Her ability to inspire her





pupils with a love of literature in all its forms, to encourage them to pursue an in-depth study of the texts, and to open their minds to new authors and poets have left their mark on many pupils at Eltham: I am sure that the current crop of Upper Sixth formers holding offers to read English at Oxford and Cambridge will testify to this. When Kimberley first arrived she helped to introduce the concept of Form Prefects and the topic of Critical Thinking to our Sixth Formers, and she has been in charge of School Debating leading our teams to the finals of the Oxford Union Debate. She always intrigued me when I asked how our team had performed in the various debating competitions: her comments were nearly always that the scoring in these debates defied understanding and that she did not agree with the result – even when we won! Many Elthamians will remember her as the person who inspired them to enjoy English, and I am sure she will do the same in Warwick.

We wish all our staff the very best for their futures whether in retirement or in pursuit of further challenges.

Last year we enjoyed Mr Cheshire's Morris Minors, and this year I was tempted to invite Mr Willatt to bring forward his ECO-Warriors, but he told me they were too exhausted after the construction of the plastic bottle Greenhouse next to our vegetable allotment. They are a formidable bunch of Lower School boys who masterminded the greener journey to school competition and upset a number of staff who had clearly not managed to grasp the point of our ECO-day – their photos were taken for naming and shaming as they arrived alone in their cars, and no excuses were accepted! Much energy was saved or recycled on the day, thanks to the embargo on the use of lights, computers and Interactive Whiteboards, the provision of a salad lunch rather than Friday's fish n' chips, and the attempts by the Junior School to use every bit of litter and fallen leaf in an art project! Visits by Global Action Plan and to Bedzed, the energy efficient housing estate were part of our attempt to raise greater awareness within the whole community of our duty to seek out a more sustainable life for the future. Many prospective parents at our June Open Morning were inspired by one of our Year 7 boys whose impassioned talk about saving the planet left a very positive impression of our school.

Mr Packer's presence today has led us all to reflect on how we can be inspired: it can be through our teachers, like Mr Dunman and his fellow hockey coaches who have led some of

our sides to an undefeated season, like Mr McCartney who as both the Head of Chemistry and Geology encourages so many of his pupils to achieve at the highest levels in his subjects, or like Mrs Green for her Scrabble Club and encouragement of boys to read a variety of novels. Sometimes inspiration comes from non-teachers like Mr O'Connor, our Clerk of Works who has promoted fencing to a remarkable level of success within the school and in national competitions.

On other inspirational occasions, pupils themselves are the protagonists in encouraging and supporting of others, like our Sixth Formers in Community Service who visit Primary Schools and Secondary Schools, and who try to help others who lack the confidence to make progress at school. I cannot miss this opportunity to sing the praises of Hamish Greer, our Head Prefect. In terms of inspiring other pupils to get involved, Hamish leads from the front: he has led Stage Crew for a number of years and was the technical support behind last year's Edinburgh Fringe production, and will be in charge again of the production of the musical *Nine* this year. Last year he led the L6 team that trained five Primary Schools Choirs to sing at our Community Service Party for Senior Citizens, and this year he has led the College's Debating Team to triumph around the country. He has been so involved in the Music Department and ECCO that, when Mr Pollard's recent illness struck, Hamish was the obvious choice to step into his shoes to act as compère at last Saturday's Pops Concert – Mr Pollard is rather concerned to hear that he may be second on the list for this role next year – behind Hamish. On Thursday evening our Leavers will celebrate the end of their time at Eltham at a Venetian Ball in this marquee: many of the decorations and extra funds raised to provide additional entertainment at the Ball stem from Hamish's efforts. When I asked Mrs Clough, who has been running the team to arrange the Ball, how everything was going, she just smiled and said "Hamish is on top of it"! In addition to all this, Hamish has of course kept the Prefects up to the mark, as well as securing the offer of a place to read English at Cambridge!

Mrs Head-Rapson's plans to help improve a Secondary School in Tanzania have also received support from the pupils who organised, amongst other things, a Charity Acoustic Evening. As you can see from your Speech Day programme charitable activity this year has enabled us to collect over £25,000 for local and international charities. Not included in that list is the amount raised from the Blackheath to Mottingham Fun Run: over 180 runners, supporters and marshals took part in this inaugural event, and we are delighted to be able to present to

[Following the presentation] Earlier this term we played host to a visiting cricket side from Adelaide, and when talking about Phil Packer's achievements, one of their coaches told me about a term currently being used in Oz to promote success – something the Aussies know a lot about – that phrase is “motivational stamina”. If there is one phrase that could sum up for me what we can all learn from Phil's remarkable story and his amazing triumph over adversity, motivational stamina would have to be close to it. What is so impressive about Phil



is not just what he has achieved, but how he has kept going against seemingly impossible odds: his stamina, both literally and metaphorically, is amazing. This evening I have tried to recall activities and individuals from the academic year that may have inspired our young people to go that bit further, to do something special, and to make a difference. I hope that we can all be inspired by Phil's motivational stamina, remembering that all of what we achieve is only worth it if we have the stamina to see it through right to the end...and then go some more.

## The Speaker at Speech Day

**Our Guest of Honour at Speech Day: Phil Packer OE, founder of the British Inspiration Trust**

Phil Packer was a pupil at Eltham College from 1980, when he joined the Junior School, until 1988, when he left at the end of Year Eleven. He spoke of his days at the school as being difficult – and that his behavioural problems were largely the result of growing up in a home dominated by domestic violence. His subsequent career in the army was cut short in 2008 when, while serving in Basra, his legs were paralysed after a rocket attack on the vehicle in which he was travelling. However Phil refused to be constrained by his disability. He has completed the London Marathon twice, rowed across the English Channel, climbed El Capitan in California, one of the world's greatest rock climbs, and also walked up Ben Nevis, Scafell and Snowdon in seventy-two hours. In his speech, delivered without notes, he chose “belief” as his theme. He spoke of teachers at Eltham College who had believed in him, notably Simon McGrahan, and John Linscott, then Head of Games, and also spoke of the value of parents and how inspirational his mother had been to him. His time spent in a wheel chair had given him an insight into the day-to-day lives of disabled people and led him to become patron of Help for Heroes, which raises funds for injured servicemen; this he did largely out of his own self-belief. He has

recently founded the organization, the British Inspiration Trust, which inspires young disabled people by encouraging celebrities from the world of sport and entertainment to meet with them and inspire them. The organization also helps disabled people to find jobs and lead active lives. Phil ended his inspirational address by encouraging everyone to try to give up some of their time for charity.

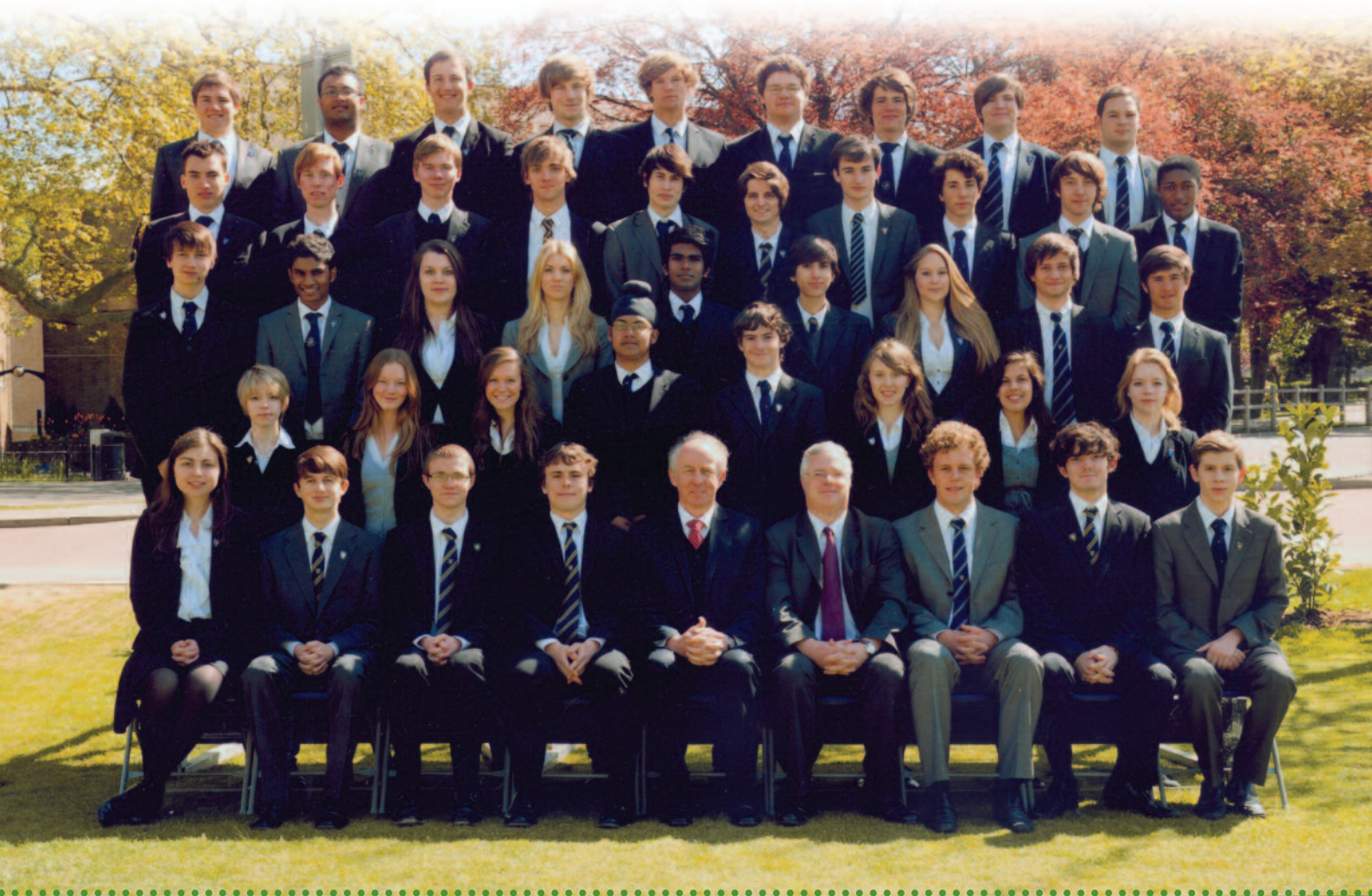
